to report the news for WORLD PRESS



Freedom of the Press is an idea supported by many governments around the world. It protects people who report the news so that they are able to do their job. These people are called journalists and most are committed to telling the truth in the stories they report. Being able to report the news is an important part of democratic societies because it allows ordinary people to access facts about the world and exercise their rights and responsibilities as citizens.



World Press Freedom Day celebrates the role of journalists who work very hard to provide factual and unbiased information to people like you and me. It's also a time to recognise the good work of governments around the world that continue to protect a free press.



Materials

- Cardboard/Paper
- Foil
- Recycled small box
- Crayons/Textas/Pencils
- Glue stick or sticky tape
- Scissors (please be careful with these)
- Cardboard roll (optional)





Instructions

Microphone

- **1.** First make a handle for your microphone. Take a piece of paper or cardboard and decorate it with some colour and pattern.
- 2. Now roll your cardboard or paper to make a tube and sticky tape it into place.
- **3.** Next make the top of the microphone. Use some foil or paper and scrunch it into a ball a little bigger than your tube.
- **4.** Attach the head of the microphone to the handle using some sticky tape around the base.
- Add an on/off button, draw on or cut 5. and stick a paper button!

<u>Video Camera</u>

- 6. It's time to make your video camera. Find a box in your recycling basket. Cover it in foil or coloured paper and secure it with sticky tape.
- Make two more tubes. Sticky tape the first 7. to the centre of the front of the box as a camera lens. Tape the second tube to the back of the box as a viewfinder.
- 8. Cut a strip of cardboard that is about three fingers wide and slightly longer than the width of your hand. This is going to be the handle for your video camera.
- Tape both sides of the cardboard strip 9. securely to one side of your box so that your hand can fit snugly inside.
- **10.** Finally, design some special buttons for the other side of your box. Either draw these or sticky tape button shapes on your camera.





Sniff Out a Story

Journalists are sometimes called newshounds because they can 'sniff' out a good story.

Why not brainstorm a few ideas with your family. To the right is an example to practise with while you sniff out your own news story.

Journalist: Good morning, I'm coming to you live from a small street in Spain where a man has been seen taking his pet goldfish for a walk during the quarantine period. The owner of the goldfish is with me now to describe what happened.

Man with Goldfish: Yes, yes! I heard that people could finally take their dogs for a walk. So I thought that my goldfish deserved a walk too. We got to the end of my street and then the police stopped me.

Journalist: I see. Can you please explain to our viewers what happened next?

Man with Goldfish: The police said that I needed to take my goldfish straight home!

Journalist: You heard it first here on Quarantine News. Back to you in the studio.


